Survivors and allies demand urgent action to prevent digital harms and keep children safe online

World leaders urged to seize historic opportunity at the inaugural Global

Ministerial on Ending Violence Against Children to make bold commitments to

create a safe digital world for children and young people

6 November, 2024 Bogotá, Colombia: Today, survivors and allies came together to demand urgent action from world leaders to address the growing threat of online child abuse and ensure a safe digital future for children.

Safe Online, the Brave Movement, and WeProtect Global Alliance, along with 15+ partners, hosted the Satellite event 'Safe Digital Futures for Children'. The event, held at the margins of the inaugural Global Ministerial Conference on Ending Violence Against Children, aimed to build momentum and urge governments to end all forms of violence against children, including online violence.

Children globally are experiencing escalating threats in the digital world like grooming, abuse, and sexual extortion. In 2023 alone, 36 million reports of suspected child sexual abuse material were made. Advances in technology, including AI, are intensifying these dangers, posing a global public health crisis and causing severe harms to children's mental and physical well-being.

Online violence is pervasive, impacting children of all ages and genders across the globe. As per the Instituto Nacional de Salud (INS), approximately 30,575 children experienced sexual violence in Colombia in 2023. The Te Protejo hotline, operated by Red PaPapaz, reports that nearly 700 websites were blocked in Colombia in 2023 alone for hosting child sexual abuse and exploitation material.

Advocate Rhiannon-Faye McDonald, a survivor of technology-assisted child sexual abuse and campaigner against online sexual violence, said, "When I was 13 years old, I was groomed online by a much older man who was pretending to be someone else. No child should ever have to experience what I went through. We have had thirty years to address this, and yet the self-regulation of tech companies has failed miserably in protecting children. The number of children harmed by technology-assisted child sexual abuse is ever-increasing. We see victims and survivors being continually re-traumatised by the ongoing circulation of the images and videos of their sexual abuse."







Bad actors continue to exploit technology to abuse children, with inadequate barriers to stop them and insufficient safeguards for children on digital platforms.

Marija Manojlovic, Executive Director of Safe Online, said, "The rising tide of online violence against children demands urgent action—for far too long, we've left children to navigate the dangers of the digital world on their own. Safe Online, the only global fund dedicated to combating online child sexual exploitation and abuse and other digital harms, has invested nearly \$100 million across 100 countries, yet this is only a drop in the ocean compared to the magnitude of the crisis. Together with Brave and WeProtect Global Alliance, we call for bold, immediate action at the upcoming Ministerial. A safer digital future is within reach—if we act now."

The event brought together Ministers and high-level government representatives from nearly 10 countries globally, along with UN officials, policymakers, civil society, academics, industry leaders, media, survivors, and youth groups. Together, they discussed the escalating threats and emerging trends in online harms to children, as well as explored solutions and country-level actions to ensure child online safety.

The event concluded with a strong call to action for governments to ensure that children's safety is embedded in the design of the digital world. It urged governments to accelerate momentum on <u>survivor-informed Call to Action</u> which advocates for bold, globally aligned legislation that puts children's well-being at the forefront. The Call to Action also emphasises the need for sustainable funding to combat online exploitation and urges that survivors and children remain at the center of all efforts. Additionally, it calls for governments to mandate that online platforms adopt safety-by-design principles and swiftly remove child sexual abuse material.
